DISCUSSION

The findings in this research are specific to our county, but many times are very similar to other research data. Discussion of these findings may help to shed some light on why some of these injuries occur.

Wisconsin farmers not only plant and harvest, but are also involved with dairy, beef, pork and other animal endeavors. They work with numerous chemicals that affect their total output and quality of their produce. They race with time, weather and financial pressures. All of these factors and many more help contribute to the number of farm injuries.

One factor, age, is a significant statistic with this research. Combining the 0-19 year age span results in 35.8% of the injuries. Farm accidents are occurring in a large number of children. Farm Statistics, by Roger R. Tormoehlin, indicated in a 15 year study of child-related farm fatalities, 247 children were killed, 29% of all the fatalities that occurred on the farm. LaCrosse Lutheran Hospital, in a 6½ year period ending June 1984, admitted 105 children that was a result of trauma on the farm. In our 30 week study, 26 children from 0-14 years were treated for injuries and 22 from 15-19 years of age. Most of the injuries were animal related. In the 4 to 5 year ages, there were 7 injuries and the incidence increased again in the teen years.

Unlike other occupations, farming involves children. Everyone works together, it's a family occupation. That's one of the reasons that farming is so appealing to many They feel it is a great place to raise a families. family, a certain closeness that cannot be duplicated anywhere else. This environment, because of the nature of the occupation, exposes everyone to a wide variety of hazards. These hazards, especially to preschoolers, becomes a curiosity and many times results in injuries. Responsibilities increase with age. On some farms, 8 or 9 year olds are operating tractors. In one study children 14 and under, who were operating a tractor were 9 times more likely to have accidents than adults. Too many children are becoming victims of farm injuries. Prevention measures might include safety education, formal instruction in the maintenance and operation of equipment and teaching first aid for farm injuries.
