Immunization Recommendations

If your child is insured, vaccinations need to be done by your primary care provider. Vaccines listed below are offered at the Grant County Health Department, Immunization Clinics and WIC/Health Check clinics for infants and children that are Medicaid eligible, uninsured, or have health insurance that does not cover vaccinations. There is no charge for these immunizations. Bring records of any immunizations your child has had with you to the clinics.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. If the child has an elevated temperature (above 100.4 degrees), an immunization should be postponed.
- 2. Unusual reactions to an immunization such as prolonged fever (above 105 degrees) or convulsions should be reported to your family physician or the Grant County Health Department.
- **3.** It is recommended that children ages 6 months up to 5 years receive the influenza vaccine each year for influenza season. Best time to vaccinate is October through December.
