# You are NOT ALONE



Experiencing a behavioral or mental health crisis? Crisis services can provide:

## Someone to Talk to

Crisis workers can provide crisis counseling, supportive listening or referrals to appropriate behavioral health services for longer term services.

### Someone to Respond

Crisis workers provide evidence-based risk assessment and safety planning. They create follow-up care plans that help identify and address risk factors. They can involve other professionals or natural supports to try to help the person navigate their crisis.

### A Place to Go

Crisis workers strive to use the least restrictive necessary interventions to keep a person safe. They offer voluntary referrals to services ranging from outpatient, crisis stabilization centers or inpatient hospital stays. As a last resort, they can evaluate the person for an involuntary hospitalization, commonly called an emergency detention. Crisis services are NOT an automatic referral to law enforcement or hospitalization.

# Contact help by:

- Calling (or texting) 1-800-362-5717 which connects you to local mobile crisis staff from Unified Community Services (UCS) or, during off-hours, Northwest Connection's staff.
  - Anyone in Grant or Iowa County is eligable.
    - Do NOT have to be a UCS client.
- Dialing 988 takes you to Wisconsin's Lifeline. This goes to Family Services and is answered 24/7/365.
- Texting HOME to 741741 will connect you with the Crisis Text Line 24/7
- Calling 1-866-488-7386 or texting 678-678 connects you with Trevor Project LGBTQ+ crisis intervention.
