WHEREAS, a proof of publication and giving notice to Jamestown Township Clerk of such hearing is attached to this document.

WHEREAS, the Conservation, Sanitation and Zoning Committee now recommends to the Board of Supervisors of Grant County the adoption of this map amendment.

THEREFORE, the Grant County Board of Supervisors does ordain as follows. That the Zoning District Map for the Township of Jamestown will be amended to include the following described land as 4ac. more or less to

Don Splinter, seconded by John Patcle, made a motion to approve the passage of Ordinance 67 To Opt-In for Category B—IOHs to comply with the table of Statutory Weight Limits under Sec. 348.15 (3) (g). Option E Opt-In for Category B—IOHs Pursuant to Sec. 348.15(9) (f) 2.a. to follow the Table of Statutory Weight Limits under Sec. 348.15(3) (g) for Grant County. Motion carried.

# Ordinance to Opt-In for Category B—IOHs to Comply with the Table of Statutory Weight Limits under Sec. 348.15 (3) (g) Ordinance No. 67

## Option E Opt-In for Category B—IOHs Pursuant to Sec. 348.15(9) (f) 2.a. to follow the Table of Statutory Weight Limits under Sec. 348.15(3) (g)

Effect of this Option E: Adoption of this ordinance pursuant to Sec. 348.15(9)(f)2.a. of Wis. Statutes (as provided by 2013 Wis. Act 377) means that the governing body of a municipality or county imposes on all highways or specified highways under its jurisdiction, the maximum single axle limits and maximum gross vehicle weight limits as established in Sec. 348.15(3)(g) for all Category B implements of husbandry as defined in Sec. 340.01(24)(a)1.b. (see Act 377). Sec. 348.15(9) (f) 1. provides that unless a municipality opts in by adopting a resolution or ordinance, there is no weight limit per wheel, axle, or group of axles, on Category B implements of husbandry as defined in Sec. 340.01(24)(a)1.b. However, the maximum gross weight vehicle weight of 92,000 pounds applies to these described vehicles. All implements of husbandry are required to comply with seasonal and special postings and any postings on highway bridges or culverts under Sec. 349.16 of Wis. Statutes.

Whereas, 2013 Wis. Act 377 under Sec. 348.15(9) (f) 1. provides that there is no weight limitation per wheel, axle, or group of axles for Category B implements of husbandry as defined in Sec. 340.01(24)(a)1.b., but does apply gross vehicle weight limitations to these vehicles, and

Whereas, Wis. Stat, § 348.15(9) (f) 1. authorizes the municipality or county to require compliance with axle weight limitations established under Sec. 348.15(3)(g) for Category B implements of husbandry defined in Sec. 340.01(24)(a)1.b. on all highways under its jurisdiction.

Now, therefore, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the County Highway Committee of Grant County, that pursuant to Sec. 348.15(9) (f) of Wis. Statutes, all implements of husbandry (including Category B implements of husbandry) defined in Sec. 340.01(24) (a) 1.b. may not exceed the weight limits imposed by Chapter 348.15(3) (g) of Wis. Statutes.

Further, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED that to exceed the length and/or weight limitations on highways under this jurisdiction a no-fee permit may be applied for from the municipal jurisdiction.

Further, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED that pursuant to Sec. 348.27(19)(b)4m.a. in the event an application for a no-fee permit is made for a Category B implement of husbandry as defined in Sec. 340.01(24)(a)1.b., the municipal jurisdiction or county is required to provide an approved alternate route, which may include highways that are not under this jurisdiction if prior approval has been given by the jurisdiction over the alternate routes not under this

entity's jurisdiction for operation of Category B implements of husbandry as defined in Sec. 340.01(24)(a)1.b.

Further, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED that this ordinance shall remain in effect until rescinded by further action of the Committee.

Further, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED that a copy of this ordinance shall be provided to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to be posted on the state DOT website.

<u>Amendment to the ATV Ordinance</u>: Dave Lambert, Highway Commission presented the ATV Trail additions that have been approved by the Highway Committee and Traffic Safety Committee to be added to Grant County Ordinance 65 originally passed on April 16, 2013.

County Trunk Highway VV, from Hwy 81 in Cassville, extending northwest to Closing Dam Road.

County Trunk Highway VV, from Good-Nuf Hollow Road, extending northwest to Duncan Road.

County Trunk Highway V, from Squirrel Hollow Road, extending west to the Glen Haven Boat Landing within the Village of Glen Haven.

Patrick Schroeder, seconded by Dan Timmerman, made a motion to approve the new ATV trails and add to Ordinance 65 for Grant County. Motion carried.

Resolution Promoting a Health in all Policies (HiAP) Framework to Guide Policymaking: Jeff Kindrai, Health Department Director presented the resolution to the Board, and explained to the board that this was a non binding resolution for the county.

Carol Beals, seconded by Dale Hood, made a motion to approve Resolution #06-14 for the Grant County Health Department. Motion carried with four nay votes.

#### Resolution Promoting a Health in All Policies (HiAP) Framework to Guide Policymaking<sup>1</sup>

**WHEREAS**, Health in All Policies (HiAP)<sup>1</sup> is a systemic and sustained approach to taking into account the impacts of public policies on health determinates and health systems across sectors, at the levels the decisions are made, in political, legislative and administrative processes, in order to realize health-related rights and to improve accountability for population health and health equity.<sup>2</sup> And

**WHEREAS**, the American Public Health Association has adopted a policy of Promoting Health Impact Assessment to Achieve Health in All Policies<sup>3</sup> and collaborated with multiple partners to produce Health in All Policies: A Guide for State and Local Governments;<sup>4</sup> and

**WHEREAS**, the Institute of Medicine recommended that federal, state, and local decision-makers adopt a Health in All Policies approach;<sup>5 6</sup> and

**WHEREAS**, Health in All Policies is reflected in both the National Prevention Strategy work across seventeen Federal departments, agencies and offices, and the Healthy People 2020 approach to social determinants of health; and

**WHEREAS**, the National Association of County and City Health Officials<sup>9</sup> and the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials<sup>10</sup> all published materials describing, guiding and supporting Health in All Polices approach and;

**WHEREAS**, the California Health in All Policies Task Force, <sup>11</sup> the Texas Health in All Policies Project, <sup>12</sup> and the Minnesota Public Health Association <sup>13</sup> have established websites including resources such as reports, presentations, meeting agendas and minutes describing decisions taken and examples of HiAP in action; and

**WHEREAS**, Health in All Policies has been promoted by the World Health Organization<sup>14</sup> and practiced more extensively in other parts of the world,<sup>15</sup> with promising results in improving health<sup>16</sup> and

**WHEREAS** the Wisconsin State health plan, Healthiest Wisconsin 2020 which is a guide for creating and improving health throughout the state of Wisconsin, states that, "[L]eaders can consider the potential health impact of policy options, and can choose to implement policies that improve the health of individuals." <sup>17</sup> and

**WHEREAS**, the Wisconsin Public Health Association (WPHA) has adopted the intersectoral resolution, Supporting the use of Health Impact Assessments (HIAs) to guide policymaking, <sup>18</sup> which includes health in policy decision making, and

**WHEREAS**, Public Health responsibilities in support of a Health in All Policies approach include:

- Understanding the political agendas and administrative imperatives of other sectors;
- Building the knowledge and evidence base of policy options and strategies;
- Assessing comparative health consequences of options within the policy development process;

- Creating regular platforms for dialogue and problem solving with other sectors;
- Evaluating the effectiveness of intersectoral work and integrated policy making;
- Building capacity through better mechanisms, resources, agency support and skilled and dedicated staff; and
- Working with other arms of government to achieve their goals; <sup>19</sup> and

**WHEREAS**, tactics to implement Health in All Policies include: clear mandates for intersectoral collaboration, mediation across interests, accountability and transparency, stakeholder participation, and practical projects to build partnerships and trust. Ultimately, health sectors must learn to work in partnership with other sectors and jointly explore opportunities for collaboration and innovation.<sup>20</sup>

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Grant County Board of Supervisors that the Grant County Board hereby:

- 1. Supports reaching out to diverse partners and communities to advance a shared view of health that crosses all levels and sectors of society to address the origins and the distribution of the social determinants of health.
- 2. Supports the efforts of global, national, state, local and community partners in learning about, sharing ideas, reaching agreement, and applying tools, concepts and principles from a Health in All Policies framework to improve population health.

#### **RESOLUTION #09-14**

### SUPPORTING STATE FUNDING FOR COUNTY 911 SERVICES/ONE DESIGNATED PUBLIC SERVICE ANSWERING POINT PER COUNTY

WHEREAS 911 emergency dispatch services are among the most vital services that counties provide and Wisconsin residents expect the same level of excellent service throughout the state, regardless of where their emergency occurs; and,

WHEREAS the state of Wisconsin in 2003 established a fee on all wireless phones to fund grants to counties to pay for enhanced 911 services, such as wireless call locating software and equipment; and,

WHEREAS in 2009, the enhanced 911 grant program expired and, in its place, the Wisconsin Counties Association and the state's telecommunications providers advocated establishing a permanent grant program to fund equipment purchases and training for employees of county-designated Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs), each county to designate one PSAP per county by resolution, to be funded with a monthly fee of up to 75-cents on all devices capable of dialing 911; and,

WHEREAS, instead of funding grants to county Public Safety Answering Points the Wisconsin Legislature and the Governor in 2009 redirected the funding and established the 75-cent monthly Police and Fire Protection Fee for all such devices and directed the revenue from the fee to fund the county and municipal aid (shared revenue) account to meet other state financial obligations; and,

WHEREAS without the intended state funding counties must rely almost entirely on property taxes to pay for equipment, training, and consolidation of municipal and county 911 services with many counties unable to upgrade needed equipment to receive texts, video, and still photographs, to provide needed training to 911 system operators, and to foster further consolidation of services; and,

WHEREAS eliminating the Police and Fire Protection Fee and restoring the funding for 911 without replacing the lost revenue would result in a roughly \$50 million annual reduction in shared revenue payments to municipalities and counties; and,

WHEREAS under current law each county must individually contract with a telecommunications provider for telephone lines running into each county 911 center and counties must depend on a maximum 40-cent monthly fee on only landline telephones to pay telecommunications providers for the cost of this service; and,

WHEREAS revenues from the 40 cent landline fee are declining due to the increased use of cellular telephones and the fee is often insufficient to cover the cost of these services, thereby requiring any difference to be paid for with property taxes;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Grant County Board of Supervisors hereby urges the Wisconsin Legislature and Governor to support legislation and state budget action that accomplishes **all** of the following goals:

- Fully funds the County and Municipal Aid Program (shared revenue) with state General Purpose Revenue, rather than the Police and Fire Protection Fee; and,
- Establishes a technology-neutral fee on all cell phones, landline phones, and other devices capable of dialing 911; and,
- Uses the revenue from this fee to fund a grant program to pay for equipment purchases and training for one Public Safety Answering Point (911 center) per county, as designated by the county board of each county, and to develop financial incentives to encourage consolidation of 911 services; and,
- Provides a sustainable source of funding for costs associated with providing all telephone lines (landline and cellular) into county Public Safety Answering Points.

BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to:

- The WCA Board of Directors for consideration at the WCA Annual Business Meeting.
- All other 71 Counties within the State of Wisconsin urging that all county officials support the resolution to restore the funding for this vital public safety service.
- The Governor of the State of Wisconsin and all Wisconsin State Legislators with a constituency within Grant County
